#### **PANEL ON COASTAL ZONES POWER, POLITICS AND LIVELIHOODS**

New attention on the coastal zones of Southeast Asia and the South Pacific are driven by multiple interests in conservation, planning, security, international relations as well as economic. Power relations are involved at many different levels involving among others: governments, fishing and timber companies, non-government organisations as well as local communities and those who claim to represent their interest. This panel would be interested in issues of power and agency, policy and outcomes as well as political economy, on themes including:

coastal communities and sustainable livelihoods  
coastal planning, conservation and community participation  
gender, access and management of coastal resources

coastal zones, history and power  
epistemic communities and policy  
conservation, management and policy  
transborder conservation, nationalism and identity  
migration and the coast  
national security, coasts and the state

Objectives of the panel include:

To pull together ongoing scholarship on coastal zones of southeast Asia and the South Pacific in a way that captures contemporary dynamics of institutional power and politics and their outcomes in terms of policy, planning and management practices, natural resource use patterns, as well as community development and involvement in the policy process.

To aim towards international publication in any of Southeast Asia, Europe or Australasia, specifically publications (either in journal or books) that could combine both Southeast Asia and South Pacific scholarships.
