component of the Communication, Education and Public Awareness (CEPA) programme of the Convention by offering new electronic communication tools designed to increase interaction with Parties, Governments and stakeholders.

The **CGIAR-CSI** is now able to provide "Hole-filled seamless SRTM 90m Digital Elevation **Data**" for almost the entire globe for download (Australia is not processed yet, but should be ready in the next couple of months). The SRTM DEM's have a resolution of 90m, and are provided in 5 deg x 5 deg tiles for easy download and use. These are available in both ArcInfo ASCII and GeoTiff format to facilitate ease of use. It seems the world just can't get enough of Nemo – the little clownfish star of the animated blockbuster, Finding Nemo. But as a result of all the attention, it's more about saving Nemo than finding him – with worldwide demand for tropical fish soaring since the release of the movie. In Vanuatu, there's been **wholesale harvesting of aquarium fish**, prompting allegations of corruption and exploitation. Environmentalists claim that international aquarium traders have been quick to cash in on the film's popularity, and as Mark Corcoran reports, the fear now is that the trade will destroy Vanuatu's tourism industry and threaten the supply of eating fish - vital for the survival of Pacific island communities.
