<b>Title</b>	Chair of Webinar
<b>Bio</b>	Dr Julie Smith (B Ec (Hons)/B A (Asian Studies), PhD) is an awarded Australian Research Council Future Fellow at the Research School of Population Health, Australian National University. She is also a Fellow of the Tax and Transfer Policy Institute at the ANU Crawford School of Public Policy. Previously she held ARC and NHMRC funded appointments at the School of Regulation and Global Governance (Regnet), and the Australian Centre for Economic Research on Health (ACERH). Her research focusses on gender analysis, taxation policy, and economic aspects of breastfeeding, with more than 45 peer reviewed articles, book chapters and books. She has been an expert advisor to the World Health Organization and the US Department of Health and Human Services, the Australian Department of Health, and to national and international NGOs including ACROSS, UNICEF UK, IBFAN, and WABA. She is a co-founder of WBTi Australia, and a former director of the Australian Breastfeeding Association. Previously, she was a senior economist in the Australian and New Zealand treasuries and at the Parliamentary Research Service in Canberra.

<b>Bio</b>	Miranda Stewart is Professor of Law at the University of Melbourne Law School where she is Director of the Tax Group and is a Fellow at the Tax and Transfer Policy Institute at the Crawford School of Public Policy, The Australian National University. Miranda was the inaugural Director of the Institute from 2014 to 2017. Miranda has more than 25 years research, practical and leadership experience in tax law and policy in academia, government and the private sector across a wide range of topics including gender budgeting and gender equality in tax and transfer systems. Miranda edited <i>Tax, Social Policy and Gender</i> (2017, ANU Press) and has recently presented about gender budgeting to the Overseas Development Institute in the United Kingdom and to the government of Ethiopia, as well as giving evidence before the Victorian Government Parliamentary Inquiry into gender budget

In 2008 she was an adviser to the Timor Leste Secretary of State for the Promotion of Equality, and from 2009-11 she convened an ANU Women in Politics course with participants from across Asia-Pacific region.

<b>Bio</b>	Dr J. P. Dadhich (MD) is a senior paediatrician based in Delhi, India. He is trained in Paediatrics and Neonatology; Developmental Neurology; Infant and Young Child Feeding and Research Methods. He has been associated with Breastfeeding Promotion Network of India (BPNI), the premiere organization working in the field of infant nutrition and other related issues in India. He is the Co-chair of the Global Council of International Baby Food Action Network (IBFAN). He has been involved in the development and implementation of World Breastfeeding Trends Initiative (WBTi), a unique research tool for the assessment of the policies and programme on infant and young child feeding in countries. He has also contributed to resource-planning tool for IYCF titled World Breastfeeding Costing Initiative (WBCi). His areas of special interest include International Code of Marketing of Breastmilk Substitutes; environmental impact of infant feeding; Codex Alimentarius; infant feeding and HIV; conflicts of interest in health, nutrition and research etc. He has several publications in the peer reviewed scientific journals. He has contributed to several guidelines, reports and position papers on subjects related to child health, breastfeeding and nutrition. He has also written chapters in textbooks for undergraduate and post-graduate medical students.

Previous engagements included working with UNICEF and WHO. He has worked with the WHO’s Scientific and Technical Advisory Group (STAG) on the International Code, and has been involved in developing the World Breastfeeding Trends Initiative(WBTi) and IYCF policy tools with the International Baby Food Action Network in Asia. He has also been involved in research on IYCF policies, practices and programmes, including work environments, International Code implementation, and financial aspects of the WHO/UNICEF Global Strategy on IYCF. His expertise on IYCF and IYCF-E having supported African, Middle East and South East Asia. Recently he has been engaged with IYCF and IYCF-E related policies issue also in high income countries, like Italy, Australia and Japan. He supported emergency responses, policies and capacity building and translating the IYCF Global Strategy and the IYCF-E operational guidance into national policies, preparedness plans and training packages. He is currently representing Save the Children in the steering committee of the Infant Feeding in Emergencies Core Group (IFE Core Group), the Nutrition and Food Security and Livelihood Interagency Technical Working Group, and the Global Technical Advisory Mechanism of Information and Assessments.</p>

<b>Bio</b>	Naomi Hull is a Registered Nurse, an IBCLC and has a Masters of Public Health (nutrition) and currently the Co-ordinator of the World Breastfeeding Trends Initiative Australian team. Her passion for breastfeeding and lactation began after the birth of her first child in 2001. She became a volunteer Breastfeeding Counsellor in 2006 with the Australian Breastfeeding Association and recently completed a five-year term as the Qld Branch president. During her Masters of Public Health, her interest in the ‘bigger picture’ grew stronger and for this reason chose to look at the implementation of the Australian National Breastfeeding Strategy (2010-2015) as the topic of her Dissertation. This then lead onto her current work, which involved using the World Breastfeeding Trends initiative tool to benchmark Australia’s policies and programs on infant feeding. Naomi feels strongly about finding a way to ensure the protection and fulfilment of the rights of women and children to access information and support of health and nutrition.
