Title	Chair of Webinar, Associate Professor, University of Canberra and Australian National University (ANU)	
Bio	Julie Smith (B Ec (Hons)/B A (Asian Studies), PhD) is an Associate Professor at the Health Research Institute, University of Canberra, and an Honorary Associate Professor at the ANU Crawford School of Public Policy. Her research focusses on gender analysis, taxation policy, and economic aspects of breastfeeding, with more than 60 peer reviewed articles, book chapters and books. She has been an expert advisor to the World Health Organization and the US Department of Health and Human Services, the Australian Department of Health, and to national and international NGOs including ACOSS, UNICEF UK, IBFAN, and WABA. She is a co-founder of WBTi Australia, and a former director of the Australian Breastfeeding Association. Previously, she was a senior economist in the Australian and New Zealand treasuries and in the Parliamentary Research Service in Canberra.

Bio	 Andini is an International Board-Certified Lactation Consultant (IBCLC) and a Chief Investigator in a successful MRFF Maternal Health and Healthy Lifestyle grant. She is currently working on the project titled "Scaling up the Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative in support of maternal and newborn health". Andini Pramono was awarded her PhD in population health at the ANU in 2023. Using mixed methods, her PhD thesis examined the facilitator and barriers of BFHI in Australia and Indonesia, including measuring the social value of BFHI accreditation and implementation in two hospitals in both countries.
