Context: Climate Industry?

- UNFCC and Global Climate Change problem: mechanism and instruments
- Copenhagen Accord 2009 new stakes with climate finance (\$30B to \$100B)
- Development Aid or Climate Aid
- Poverty alleviation and/or addressing CC
- Paris Agreement a guide for climate industry until 2030



Multilateral: Pacific pre- and post-Paris

Road to Paris (pre-2015)

- Special consideration SIDS
- Long-term temperature goal 1.5
- Mitigation: finance for mitigation
- Adaptation: decision making process and adaptation finance
- Loss and Damage: compensation and finance
- Technology transfer (finance)



Post-Paris Priorities and Strategies (post-2015)

- Special SIDS consideration and early ratification
- Defending1.5 goal; 2018 Facilitative Dialogue & IPCC Report
- Finance: **scale up global finance** (GCF, LDCF, SCCF, Adaptation)
- Loss and Damage: strengthen WIM; funding stream and access
- Adaptation: process SIDS specific, reporting GCF specific SIDS; Capacity Building Initiative framework
- PARTICIPATION: SIDS reps seats, and within AOSIS

Attempts at Regional Pacific Climate Governance

- SPREP 2005: Pacific Island Framework for Action on Climate Change 2006-2015 (UNFCCC)
- SPC 2005: <u>Pacific Disaster Risk Reduction and Disaster</u>
 <u>Management Framework for Action 2006-2015</u> (Hyogo Framework)
- PIF 2011 mandate "secure appropriate governance arrangements, aid disbursement modalities and procedures which accommodate the particular constraints of FICs in the development of climate financing opportunities"
- Pacific Climate Change Finance Regional Framework 2013
- Strategy for Climate and Disaster Resilient
 Development in the Pacific 2015-2025 (SDRP)

SDRP Priorities 2015-2025

Impacts:

- Rainfall intensity (decrease in frequency in cyclones)
- Sea-level rise (0.52-0.98 metres)
- Ocean acidification
- Weather-related
 disasters (flood, storm
 surges, cyclonic wind
 intensity, coastal
 erosion, saltwater
 intrusion, water
 scarcity and drought













SDRP Priorities 2015-2025

Goal 1- Strengthened integrated risk management to enhance Climate and Disaster Resilience (Climate adaptation, governance planning)

Goal 2- Low Carbon Development (Climate Mitigation, energy security and infrastructure, decreased greenhouse emissions)

Goal 3- Strengthened Disaster Preparedness, Response and Recovery (Climate Disaster)

CLIMATE Mainstreaming Whole-of-Region, Whole-of Country, whole-of government into the development sectors

<u>Target climate sectors:</u> (health, education, water and sanitation, social assistance, energy, agriculture, fisheries, tourism, culture, environment, infrastructure)

SAMOA – a CLIMATE STATE?


- Since 2007 NAPA (MNRE technical) and Climate Resilience Investment Coordination (MOF NIE)

country (UNDP supported)


Whole-of Country, whole-of govt
