






International Climate Change Adaptation Initiative (ICCAI)

\$160 million for Pacific, including \$64 million for:











Australia's adaptation finance: changing regional mix




Australia's Paris pledge: \$1 billion over 5 years

What's needed next?

- A regional strategy for climate funding
- Mainstreamed approach informed by partner countries' climate and development priorities
- Backed up by:
 - Climate risk screening for all major Pacific programs
 - Rigorous accounting of climate-related activities



The value of mainstreaming

- Review of ICCAI programs in Pacific:
 - "Future assistance should be directed towards environmentally sustainable, social and economic development that is resilient to climate change, rather than attempting to implement climate adaptation separately as a discrete additional measure"
